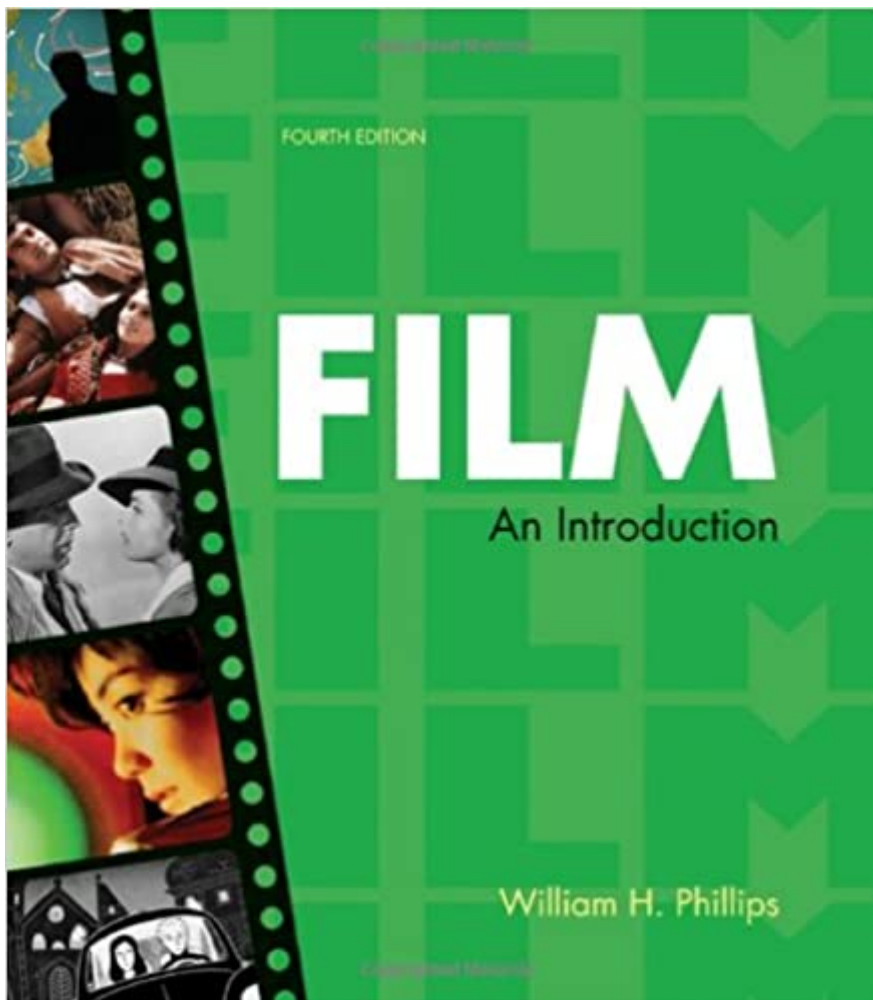

I bought this book for an Introduction to Film class, and I think the book is very well thought out. The book goes into details about different aspects of the film making process, and lists important words in bold. Furthermore, there is a summary at the end of each chapter so you can review without rereading the entire chapter again. The book does mention a few movies when giving examples of different terms or techniques, but does a good job explaining what is going on in the movie before it gives the examples. Other film books just assume that you have seen all the movies that they are talking about, so they don't introduce them, while this one does a good job of that.

This is an outstanding film guide. It is very comprehensive, but enjoyable to read as the author has clear definitions and annotated photos of films throughout. It is a wonderful tool for the novice film student and a very insightful assistant for those who enjoy--but don't fully understand--the complexity, magic and imagination of all the gifted film artists.
