SYNOPSIS These books are about my love life, which was controversial due to the many differences between US and Mexico culture. One example of conflict: Maria's father threatened to shoot me; and he had a gun. I did practice some medicine, mainly in the outback with Tarahumara Indians. Most of the books deal with Aztec Indians in central Mexico, who practiced both Aztec religion and Catholicism. The lead female character is Aztec Ambrosia, who was the local corn princess. I lived in Mexico for four years, then in 2009 I returned for another year to some of the same communities. They remembered me, for better or worse. I had been called a brujo: a male witch. This was like being called Rasputin or Charles Manson. I caused trouble by ignoring or thumbing my nose at Mexico's medieval betrothal rules. Most of the action occurs in Cacama, population 6,000. Cacama was an isolated xenophobic place; but I was a hard man to drive away. I had some police friends, and enemies. My danger of being killed due to a woman was accentuated because some fathers were said to be drug-cartel marijuana growers.

A BOOK EXCERPT Ambrosia was sixteen-years old. I sometimes called Ambrosia "Ambi." Ambi was at her corn-tamale sales post, where she was accompanied by two aunts. I pulled up ten feet away on my bike and put it on kickstand. I stood beside my bike and looked inside my camera bag for a pen. Doing so gave me a view of Ambi. Ambi looked very nervous; so I stopped looking for a pen. I planned to quickly buy corn tamales and then leave Ambi. I walked up and stood by Ambi's three-wheel tamale bike, where I patiently waited for Ambi to stop talking to her two aunts.
