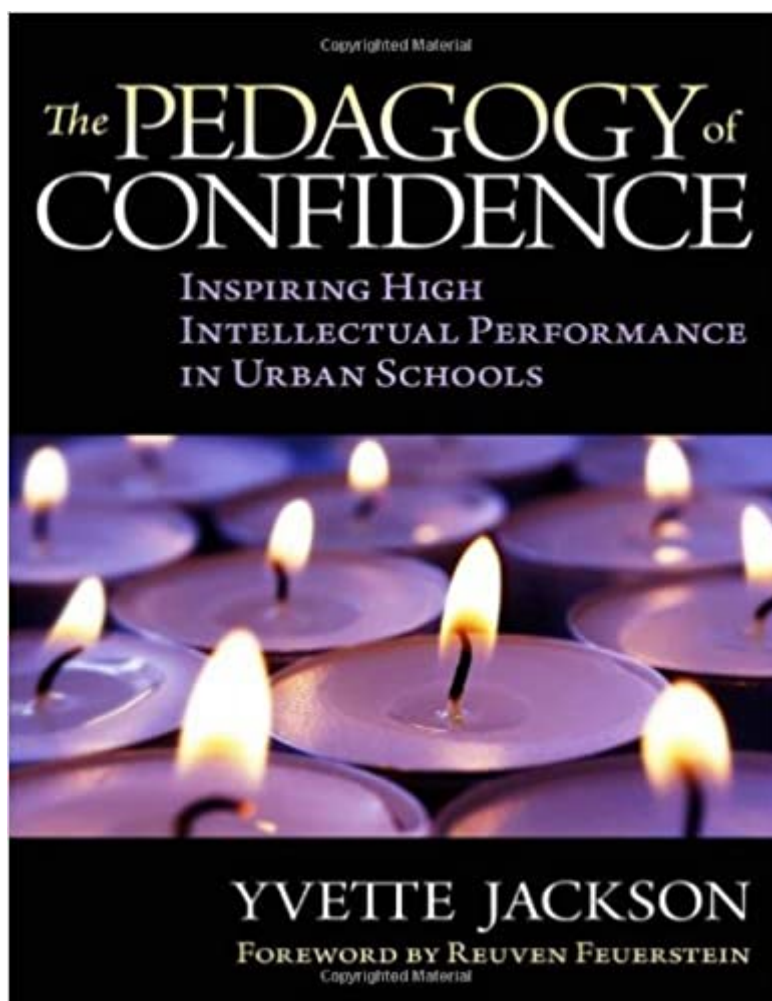

Jackson addresses how educators can systematically support the development of motivation, reflective and cognitive skills, and high performance when standards and assessments are predisposed to non-conceptual methods. Furthermore, she examines challenges and offers strategies for dealing with cultural disconnects, the influence of new technologies, and language preferences of students.

The glorious motivational insights that are outlined will put educators interested in liberating the learning potential for all students on the path to higher intellectual stimulation for them as well as their students. To fully grasp the importance of these ideas, one will need to deal with some different assumptions about students and learning. For

instance, Debilitating conditions that restrict learning must be dealt with in explicit ways and contextualizing instruction will help to build students' confidence in their ability to learn new content. Clearly, Dr. Jackson's book has raised a sweeping challenge to all those who desire to make a difference in the lives of students. If we take into account the things she shares with us about our power to impact the learning and teaching process the hope of moving all students to higher intellectual performance can be realized.
