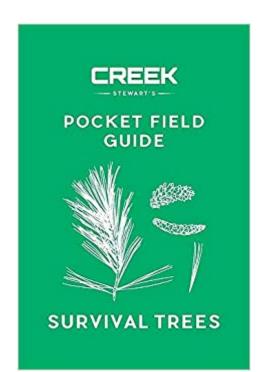

This book is not intended to be a tree identification guide. Rather, it should act as a suplement to other guides on the subject, offering survival specific information and insight that typically is not covered (or even mentioned) in the average identification guide. Creek highlights survival skills and uses with photos, illustrations and even supplemental downloads for more detailed skills. Prepare to see trees from a unique perspective rarely brought to the written page!

I don't often read a field guide from cover to cover, but when I do, it's because it's written by Creek Stewart. This slim volume is exactly what it says it is--a pocket field guide meant to be carried and referred to while in the woods although it's certainly most helpful to read in its entirely first. What I like best about it is Creek makes it so personal with his own observations and learning he's gained over the years practicing survival skills. Next on what I like are the drawings and ways to identify trees that can be used for multiple purposes. As trees here branch out over the spring, this little volume will be easy to take along in tree identification and closer look-see. (I normally don't walk in areas where I can start gathering the parts identified but looking is certainly acceptable.) In a survival situation, this is certainly a book I want to have in my Every Day Carry (EDC).
