


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Life Of Thomas Hopkins Gallaudet: Founder Of Deaf-mute Instruction In America (1888)





Synopsis

Reverend Thomas Hopkins Gallaudet, LL.D., (1787 碉 ¬â œ 1851) was a renowned American pioneer in the education of the deaf. Along with Laurent Clerc and Mason Cogswell, he co-founded the first institution for the education of the deaf in North America, and he became its first principal.
