

Set in the world of Lawrence $\tilde{A}\phi\hat{a}$ $\neg\hat{a}_{,,\phi}$ s Broken Empire trilogy but rather lighter in tone, this is the story of Prince Jalan Kendeth, grandson of the Red Queen, self-confessed coward, dedicated ladies $\tilde{A}\phi\hat{a}$ $\neg\hat{a}_{,,\phi}$ man, and devout shirker of anything remotely resembling responsibility. After a plot

to kill him goes awry, Jalan winds up on the run, paired up with a Norseman whose warrior skills are matched by his keen intelligence, to discover the truth about an army of the undead that threatens to destroy the realm. This is the first installment of a projected trilogy, set more or less concurrently with the Broken Empire trilogy; itââ ¬â,¢s not quite an outright comedy, but it comes very close. Jalan is a great characterâ⠬⠕heââ ¬â,¢s a Falstaffian neââ ¬â,¢er-do-well, and heââ ¬â,¢s content to remain that wayâ⠬⠕and the story is as richly told as the earlier trilogy: the author makes this place, a post-cataclysm earth of the far future, feel as real as any place youââ ¬â,¢ve ever visited. What I read was a story that began violently in a semi-comical manner, but gradually gruesome events grew some in occurrence, and the novel took frequent plunges into disturbingly delightful horror, with creepy beings called Unborn given a wide berth. The enigmatic Silent Sister lent a quiet aura of the macabre with her unspeakable actions. There was slapstick humor and a superhero Viking partner, named Snorri ver Snagason, bonded to Jalan, offsetting the upsetting, but the sense of foreboding draped the book; menace was a constant burden not easily un-borne. This was a good bad-thing, as was the presence of darkling sorcery and spiritual possession. All very enchanting, as is the magic of Lawrence $\tilde{A}f\hat{A}\phi\tilde{A}$ \hat{a} $\neg\tilde{A}$ \hat{a} , ϕ s writing. His prose is hypnotic and full-figured with robust similes, and there is a blending of narrative with character in which each aspect reinforces the other. This is a novel that will keep you on high alert in its unfolding, even during its dream sequences and the Snorri interludes. The book deserves five gold stars; this is not fool $\tilde{A}f\tilde{A}\phi\tilde{A}$ \hat{a} $\neg\tilde{A}$ \hat{a},ϕ s gold, but rather a reflection of the aureate splendor of a stellar work refulgent with the genius shone by a torch-bearing writer of dark fantasy at his radiant best.
