


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Sihpromatum: I Grew My Boobs In China (Volume 1)





Synopsis

"SIHPROMATUM" (Sip-row-may-tum) is a memoir series of one family's four-year backpacking adventure around the world. The first installment, "I Grew my Boobs in China", is the beginning of an intensely fascinating, sobering, and emotional memoir of Savannah's introspective and innovative family adventure. In 2005, 14-year-old Savannah Grace's world is shattered when her mother unexpectedly announces that she and her family (mother, 45; brother, 25; sister, 17) would soon embark on an incredible, open-ended journey. When everything from her pets to the house she lived in is either sold, given away or put in storage, this $na\tilde{A}f\hat{A}$ ve teenage girl runs headlong into the reality and hardships of a life on the road. These pages do not describe a vacation to semi-exotic locales protected from the local culture by a veneer of private transportation, scheduled meals, and ritzy hotels. The family lives and travels as the local people do, a distinction that generates fascinating and unusual experiences rich in multicultural insights, as told from the perspective of a budding young author with a traveler's eye for detail. Built around a startling backdrop of over eighty countries ("I Grew my Boobs in China" relates the family's adventures in China and Mongolia), this is a tale of feminine maturation - of Savannah's metamorphosis from $ing\hat{A}f\hat{A}$ on the world. Nibbling roasted duck tongues in China and being stranded in Mongolia's Gobi Desert are just two experiences that contribute to Savannah's exploration of new cultures and to the process of adapting to the world around her.

Savannah Grace was born and raised in Vancouver, Canada. At 14 she was pulled from school to travel the world before returning home 4 years later to graduate from high school. Age 24, she has traveled to 100 countries and is the author of the award winning series "Sihpromatum" which includes "I Grew My Boobs in China" and "Backpacks and Bra Straps". Co-founder of popular weekly Twitter travel chat #TRLT. Savannah is currently living with her Dutch partner in The Netherlands, where she continues to write and travel.

From the title, the reader could assume this is a different kind of travel book, which it is, but not in the sense the title might suggest. It is the story of a family's travels (mother and three siblings) far removed from the tourist path. The chronicle is laced with humor and the difficulties of backpacking in Asia. The narrator is Savannah, who at the time of the travels was 14 years old, very reluctant to leave her comfortable, middle-class home. Eventually her unhappiness changes to a reality that this is a positive, life-changing, growing experience. Their backpacking experience is both the story of their travels through China and Mongolia -- with a short added section about Siberia -- and the life of the family itself. They are somewhat odd and dysfunctional but all grit and heart. Because of their limited budget, they had to avoid the tourist trail, frequently traveling much like the locals, enduring

hardship and harsh conditions that brought them into the 'real' life, into the heart, of the countries. Because they interacted daily with mostly average people, the reader learns a lot about culture and customs -- the real deal. This is and intriguing adventure, well told, off-the-beaten-track. The book's title is explained by the author as "a Blessing that initially appears to be a curse", and this memoir takes us on the first part of a journey that it's narrator truly believes is her curse. A young Savannah, 14 years old, meets her mother's bombshell idea to spend a year with three of her children living out of backpacks in China, Mongolia and places beyond with a typical teen's overwrought response: it's the end of the world! Except of course, it's not.Ms. Grace's account retains the authentic voice of it's teen-aged narrator: dramatic, inexperienced, and nervous about change: the smells, squat toilets, and the unknown world of food and culture ahead of her. What I would have given to grow up with a mom like hers (with apologies to my own, wonderful mother); willing to strike out with three teens, 4 packs and a dream!Savannah takes us step-by-step, from initial trip planning and giving away those belongings she can't carry, through using her first squat toilet, and a search for recognizable food in a Chinese market. She gradually realizes that "everyday normality and the still beauty" that surrounds her in this new place might be worth the trip, and she stops complaining long enough to make connections with locals and travelers they meet along the way. The narrative is gleaned from journals and postcards written from the road, and the effect is an immediacy that travel memoirs sometimes lack. I look forward to Volume 2 of the family's travels.

I admit the title got my attention, but the book stands on it own merits. The author's descriptions on the journey she did not want to take are so interesting and funny in places. You can see her whole attitude changing as the book progresses, and she comes into her own as a young world traveler. Looking forward to the next installment of the family's travels.

This memoir was fascinating on so many levels, I hardly know where to begin. To start with though, the concept of a single mother traveling across Russia, China and Mongolia for a year with two teenage daughters and a sometimes cranky, if brilliant son is amazing to me. The fact that they managed to do this without all-out war, is even more amazing.
