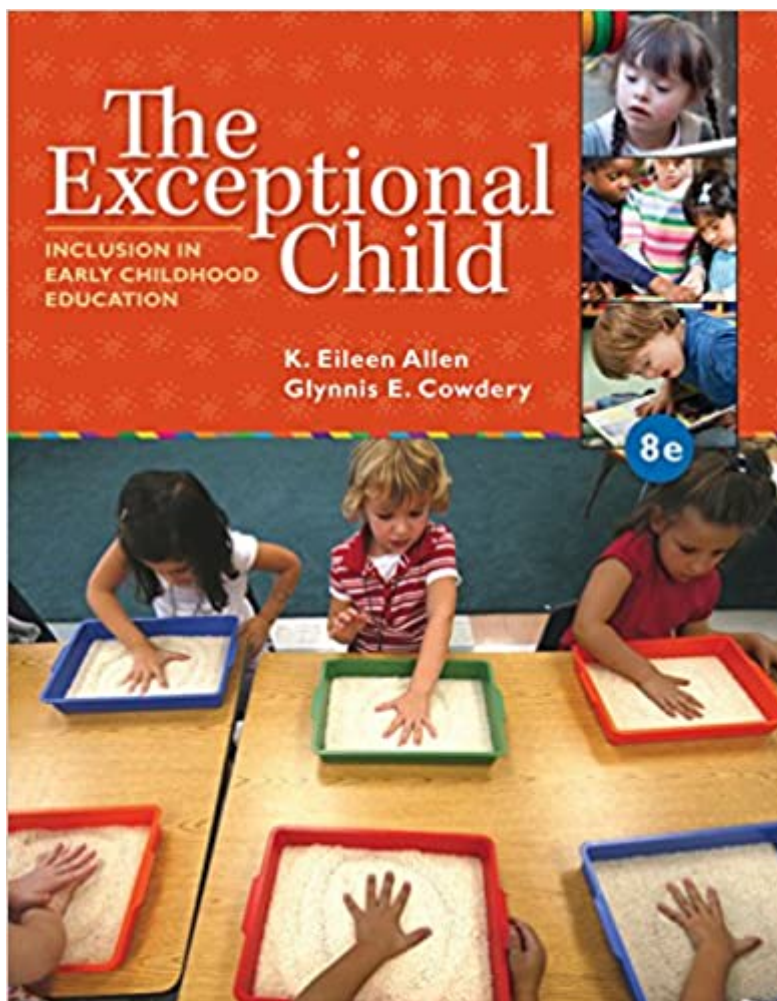

It made for a very simple class, but it would have been nice to have learned new things. The information was spot on, but as I said, basic. It touched very lightly on learning/physical disabilities and techniques which was what I was expecting to go into a lot more detail on. They could have condensed the whole book into the first 3 chapters, and then focused on a different exceptional aspect for the rest of the chapters. I have taken webinars from doctors and experts that were more informative to exceptionality and it would be great if these text were more specific. If the average educator is going to take an exceptional class, they should be armed with as much information that they can get because they may not take another class regarding this subject.Overall great info, just not enough for me.
